

A donation of \$1,000 will go to **District 'E' Hospital Trust Fund.** We gratefully donate to our District 'E' Hospital Trust Fund, which is available to help when our veterans require more extensive assistance.

And finally, a donation of \$500 will go to **Zone E4 – Posters and Literary.** Marg Murphy, the Zone E4 Youth Education Chair, will soon be awarding certificates and prizes to students whose posters and literary progressed to Zone and District.

# THE BATTLE OF NEUVE-CHAPELLE

The Battle of Neuve-Chapelle took place on March 10-12, 1915, in northern France, near Belgium. The battle provided a new role for Canadian troops who had just arrived from England, where they had been training. While not a large battle, it was not without significance from a Canadian perspective, in that it was the first time that the Canadian Expeditionary Force had been fully involved in action with the enemy.

The role of the Canadians in the battle order was to prevent the Germans in this sector from reinforcing the combat zone. This would allow the British 1<sup>st</sup> Army to successfully push through German lines and establish a new Allied front line on conquered territory. Despite this success, however, the British missed a golden opportunity to exploit their advantage.

In short the government has approved funding to maintain and extend the current short term staff required to reduce the backlog of claims. While this is welcoming and somewhat overdue, it is a move in the right direction.


Comrades there are thousands of Veterans, widows, widowers and their dependents who receive disability pensions or some form of support from Veterans Affairs Canada, and there are thousands who receive no support whatsoever.

There are Veterans who made a career of the service and receive a pension and there are those who served for short engagements and did not qualify for a pension. Did you know when a Veteran who is receiving a service pension passes away, their pension is reduced by 50 % and that is what their survivor receives; if they were receiving a disability pension, their survivor is still entitled to benefits. On the other side of the coin a Veteran passes away with no pension, no disability award and nothing in place to assist their survivor. So, where does that leave the survivor? In both cases, sometimes in a dire financial situation not of their making. With growing inflation, the pandemic, supply issues and "the high cost of everything", the basic needs for some to live are becoming out of reach.

As you know the Legion is there to help, however that assistance is short term and limited in its scope. Funding is available through the Poppy Fund and other programs based solely on donations.

So comrades, there exists the dilemma. The vacuum, where there are limited resources and not every Veteran or survivor gets the assistance they might need. You might ask what I can do. Well sometimes it's the small gesture that matters most because it boosts morale and gives self-worth to those concerned.

- Contact your MP, MPP or municipal officials;
- Buy a Veteran a coffee or meal;
- Renew their Legion membership;
- Start a conversation with them;
- Support their family in some way;
- Purchase a banner in their memory;
- Direct them where assistance is available i.e.; Service Officer or Poppy Chair or local Legion;
- Help them submit their story to the Legion's Military Service Recognition Book;
- Make a donation;
- Recognize their service is your freedom;

Submitted by Comrade Norm Marion, Branch Historian Believe it or not, we have found another Coldwater-born airman who was killed in action during the Second World War. And when I say "we", I mean Bruce Missen (again) of Coldwater, who has previously discovered several Coldwater Veterans through his genealogical research. Thank you Bruce for sharing with us. The name of the airman killed in action is Ross JH Johnstone, Flight Sergeant, RCAF, Air Gunner on a Lancaster bomber that was shot down over Germany on 23 February 1945. He will be added to our on-line Roll of Honour, included in the next Military Service Recognition Book (MSRB) volume, and featured on a banner in the fall.

# **REMEMBERING ROSS JOHNSTONE**

Born in Coldwater, Ontario, on January 12, 1924, Ross John Hugh Johnstone was the son of James and Jean (Doherty) Johnstone of Coldwater. He attended school in nearby Orillia, and was employed as a boiler maker for a year after his graduation. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force on March 30, 1943. His first months were spent training as aircrew and air gunner at various RCAF stations including Fingal and Jarvis, Ontario, and Valleyfield and Lachine, Quebec. Then, Flight Sergeant Johnstone (RCAF service number R221221) proceeded overseas to serve as an Air Gunner on Lancaster bombers with No. 625 and No.170 Squadrons (RAF). On February 23, 1945, Ross and his crew were on a mission to Pforzheim, Germany, when their Lancaster (PB 595) was shot down. Johnstone and two other crew members were killed in the crash, while four others managed to bail out, were taken prisoners, and returned home at the end of the war. Flight Sergeant Ross Johnstone was 21 when he died. He is buried in the Durnbach War Cemetery, south of Munich, Germany.

# CLEAR THE BACKLOG - VETERANS WAIT IN DIRE NEED OF DISABILITY BENEFITS

16 February 2022 - Recent reports revealed Veterans Affairs Canada is set to lose many of the staff tasked with clearing the backlog of disability benefit claims that has delayed supports for Veterans for years. The Royal Canadian Legion is calling on the Government of Canada to uphold its promise to clear the backlog that reportedly has 34,000 Veterans still waiting in dire need to receive benefits and supports. Read the letter to the Prime Minister below.

16 February 2022 Prime Minister Trudeau:

May you remain well.

I am alarmed by recent media reports revealing that crucial funds needed to help end the current Veteran disability claims backlog may not exist. It was astonishing to learn there is no tangible end in sight to this situation and we might actually see a setback in the progress that was being made.

The Minister of Veterans Affairs could not confirm whether all adjudicators specifically hired to tackle this mess will be retained past March 2022. This is especially concerning since clearing the backlog is listed as the number one priority in your mandate letter to the Minister. We ask that funds be openly guaranteed to enable these adjudicators to keep working, and to bring on even more assistance.

It was particularly distressing to hear of the 2020 warning by the Parliamentary Budget Officer that a longer commitment to temporary staff would be needed to eliminate the backlog by 2023. It appears that astute warning was not heeded, and we understand that some vital temporary staff moved on due to the uncertainty of their jobs.

Legion Service Officers assert that our Veterans are still waiting much longer than is acceptable for disability claim decisions to be made. While they await these decisions, treatment is not accessible through any VAC benefits and their health continues to deteriorate. This is indefensible and cannot continue in good conscience. Your government rolled out a pandemic plan within a very short period to assist Canadians in financial need, so we know it can be nimble and quick action is possible. Why must injured Veterans keep waiting for a similar commitment that will finally end the backlog that is further harming them?

We ask for immediate action to end this insufferable delay for our Veterans.

We stand ready to discuss and help.

# LEGION DECRIES DECISION OVER PLATINUM JUBILEE MEDAL

#### 23 February, 2022

The Royal Canadian Legion is disappointed and bewildered to hear our country does not plan to issue a Platinum Jubilee medal in 2022. A recent media report confirmed the decision by the Department of Canadian Heritage. This year commemorates the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II's ascension to the throne.

"I am saddened by this decision," says Bruce Julian, Dominion President. "A unique medal would also have allowed us an opportunity to acknowledge the outstanding service of fellow citizens."

For close to two years, the Legion has advocated for having a Platinum Jubilee medal presented to Canadians who have made a real difference in their communities. It would recognize admirable service - from military and RCMP personnel to first responders, teachers, long term care workers and others.


"The Queen is our respected Head of State, and these fellow citizens are people who have made their communities and country better," adds Julian. "We hope the

decision not to produce a medal will be reconsidered."

Canadian medals were produced for the Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977, for the Golden Jubilee in 2002, and for the Diamond Jubilee in 2012 (right). But there won't be a Canadian medal for the Platinum Jubilee this year.
