REMEMBRANCE DAY CEREMONY IN COLDWATER

Yes folks, there will be a Remembrance Day ceremony at the Cenotaph in Coldwater, on November 11. The bad news is, **public attendance is discouraged**. There will be no marching or standing parade, no military troops or Cadets, and no indoor reception afterwards. The only active participants in the ceremony will be members of the Coldwater Legion Branch executive, a chaplain, and a few other volunteers. Again, due to COVID-19 guidelines, this event is limited to a very small number of people, and therefore **attendance by spectators is discouraged**. With a few exceptions, members of the Legion will lay most of the wreaths prior to the event and perform the ceremony at the Cenotaph while respecting mask and distancing rules.



FROM THE PRESIDENT



Greetings everyone. As was mentioned last month, this year's Poppy Campaign, which opened on the last Friday in October, is focused less on the traditional Legion volunteer standing with a Poppy tray, and more on box placement within local businesses. At locations where space permits, a volunteer

may be standing within 6 ft. of a tray or wreath, but will not be handing out Poppies or handling donations. Please consider that the funds provided by this traditional annual event remain more important than ever as many Veterans head into an era of financial insecurity.

As for our traditional Veterans Recognition Dinner, which we normally held in early November, well, that too will have to be adapted to this COVID World. There will be a dinner on Sunday November 8, but the meals will be either for take-out, or, for those who may not be able to pick it up at the branch, delivered by some of our volunteers.

And on November 11, there will be a Remembrance Day ceremony at the Cenotaph in Coldwater, although it will be on a much smaller scale than we've seen before, with public attendance discouraged. There will be no marching or standing parade involving members of the Canadian Armed Forces, Veterans, or Cadets, and no indoor reception afterwards. The only active participants in the ceremony will be members of the Coldwater Branch executive, a chaplain, and a few other volunteers. With a few exceptions, most wreaths will be laid in advance by our members on behalf of individuals and organisations that have requested them - some of the exceptions include wreaths on behalf of the Canadian Armed Forces, the Royal Canadian Legion, and the federal, provincial, and municipal governments, which will be laid as part of the ceremony. Again, due to COVID-19 guidelines, attendance by spectators is discouraged. Members of the Legion will preposition the wreaths and perform the ceremony at the Cenotaph while respecting mask and distancing rules.

It is unfortunate that such measures have to be taken, but the safety of our members and members of the community must come first. Stay safe everyone. Please, continue to respect mask and distancing rules where they apply. And wash your hands!

So, with all these restrictions in place, please pause for a moment on November 11, at 11 a.m., and have a thought for all those who made the ultimate sacrifice in the service of their country.

Finally, I want to offer my condolences, on behalf of members of the Coldwater Branch, to family and friends of two of our long time members, John Stevenson and Lonnie Worrell, who passed away in October. John was 76, and Lonnie 73.

The breakdown was as follows: supply horses 220,189; supply mules 219,509; riding horses 111,171; gun (artillery) horses 87,557; and cavalry 75,342. On the first day of the Battle of Verdun, 7,000 horses were killed by shelling.

THIS MONTH WE REMEMBER

A FOAL NAMED VIMY

Although Canadian soldiers in the First World War carried heavy loads including rifle, ammunition, gas mask, shovels and more, the task of hauling the tonnes of ammunition and rations needed at the front everyday was left to horses and mules. More than 50,000 horses were shipped from Canada overseas to carry supplies and pull artillery guns. Yet in at least one documented case, a horse was added to the lot without having to make the overseas trip. To the surprise of the Canadian soldiers in the area, a foal named Vimy was born on the famous battlefield and aptly named after the battle

LEGION LAUNCHES 2020 NATIONAL POPPY CAMPAIGN

OTTAWA, ON, 30 October 2020 – A pilot project to introduce new touchless donation boxes, and the lighting of iconic landmarks in Canada are innovations marking the launch of The Royal Canadian Legion National Poppy Campaign this year. Millions of poppies will be distributed in familiar and new locations across Canada.

"We have more than thirty important partners this year, and traditional donation boxes at 25,000 locations," says Thomas D. Irvine, CD, Dominion President of The Royal Canadian Legion. "While we've had to make some changes because of the pandemic, there are several ways to donate and we are hopeful Canadians will respond as generously as they always do."

A significant change will be the introduction of new touchless donation boxes in partnership with HSBC Bank Canada. There will be 250 "Pay Tribute" boxes across the country, including in most HSBC Bank branches, in several Ontario Legion Branches, and in some select retail locations. The boxes will accept fee-free touchless donations in two-dollar increments, from any tap-enabled device or card. Donors can also choose to take a lapel poppy from the box, as they would from a traditional box. Along with traditional and electronic Pay Tribute boxes, donors can choose to donate online via Legion.ca. The digital poppy presented in partnership with HomeEquity Bank will also be available again this year at www.mypoppy.ca. It is a project of the Legion National Foundation – a charity also dedicated to supporting Veterans and promoting Remembrance. Additional campaign highlights include:


The Legion's Poppy Drop on Parliament
Hill's Peace Tower will feature a digital light show
with 117,000 virtual poppies representing each of
Canada's fallen since the beginning of the First
World War. The display runs from October 30November 11, from 6:30-9:30 pm ET, including
until midnight on the 11th. Virtual poppies will also

cascade down the Senate building at the same times, and on the National Art Centre's "Kipnes Lantern" on November 11, from 7:00 am ET to midnight. Watch live on Oct. 30 on the Legion's Facebook page.

- In honour of Canada's veterans, the CN Tower will glow red on the first day of the National Poppy Campaign. It will light up in red again on Remembrance Day, to honour our Fallen.
- The City of Toronto sign will be lit in red on October 30 and again on November 11.
- The Niagara Falls will be lit in red from 10:00-10:15 pm ET on October 30 to mark the launch of the Poppy Campaign. On Remembrance Day the Falls will also be lit in red hourly, beginning at 4:30 pm for the entire evening.
- The City of Ottawa sign will be lit in red from November 2 November 11.
- The Calgary Tower will light up in red on October 30 and November 11.
- The Science World dome in Vancouver will light up in red on October 30 and November 11.
- BC Place Stadium will display a poppy design on November 11.
- The Canada Place Sails of Light will be illuminated red on November 11.
- The Clock Tower in Mississauga will be lit on November 11, pulsating in red.
- Starting on Oct. 30 and running each night, two large screens on Parliament Hill will show the <u>Virtual Wall of Honour</u>, a silent video sharing the faces of Canadian Veterans who have passed, their photos submitted by people from across the country.

"Each year, Canadians show a tremendous amount of gratitude," says Irvine. "Our fallen Veterans sacrificed for our freedoms and we will always remember them. Through donations to the campaign, Canadians support the Legion's critical work to help ensure the well-being of serving Veterans. We thank them for their generosity."



INTRODUCING VETERAN FRANK PHILLIPS



All opportunities to interview our Veterans are an honour and a privilege. To connect with our 94 year old Able Seaman and reminisce over the latter part of the mid-1940s brought forth many recollections for our Veteran Frank.

In August 1942, Veteran Frank's brother was killed at Dieppe and this spurned him to take up arms and join the military. On March 23, 1943, at the age of 17 Comrade Frank joined the Royal Canadian Sea Cadets.

During the war years, the Canadian National Exhibition was closed and the then Automotive Building was turned into the Navy Barrack known as His Majesty's Service York. On February 9, 1944, at the age of 18, Comrade Frank joined the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserves where he remained in service until the end of the war.

Comrade Frank shared that his basic training taught him discipline and to work as a member of a team. These skills were of immense value to him when he transitioned into civilian life. For two years he followed and completed his education by attending the Dominion Business College four nights a week. This enabled him to work for the Toronto Transit Commission for the next 38 years. He

particularly enjoyed the employee perk of free transit transportation throughout the city.

While in service, Veteran Frank earned the rank of Able Seaman and Seaman Torpedo Man, and was responsible for the batteries, lights and small explosives aboard the ship. The majority of his service time was spent on the Triangle Run – Halifax, Newfoundland, New York. As well, he was on Convoy duty escorting ships carrying much needed supplies from the United States and Canada to England.

Comrade Frank recalls the building of a mine sweeper built in 1944 in Port Arthur/Fort William (now Thunder Bay). As soon as the sweeper was christened, it was sailed through the Great Lakes to Halifax to start its service.

Comrade Frank is recipient of the following medals: 1939-1945 Star; Atlantic Star and Canadian Volunteer Service Medal.

Our nonagenarian was married for 69 years and has one son and two daughters. A Legion Branch member for four decades plus, he shares his quotable quote: "Be happy. Life is short."

Comrade Frank, we thank you for your service.
