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## FLYING THE FLAG... PROPERLY!

Flying the National Flag of Canada on a pole outside your home is a display of pride and respect for your country. Yet there are certain rules of etiquette regarding the flying and handling of our National Flag that should be respected. The Government of Canada's Department of Canadian Heritage web site provides guidance on the displaying and handling of the National Flag.

"The manner in which flags may be displayed in Canada is not governed by legislation but by established practice and convention," states the web site, which is based on international usage and customs. "Given the important symbolism of flags, they should always be treated with respect."

The National Flag should always be flown on its own flagpole, with the sleeve nearest to the pole. It is improper to fly the National Flag with another flag, of any type, on the same flagpole. The National Flag may be flown day and night and does not need to be lighted while flying after sundown.

The National Flag of Canada always takes precedence over all other national flags when flown on Canadian soil.

Therefore, it should always be placed in the position of honour. The location of the position of honour depends on the number of flags flown and the type of configuration. When 2 flags are displayed, the position of honour is the farthest to the left when an observer is facing the display. When 3 flags are flown, the position of honour is in the centre. When more than 3 flags are displayed, the position of honour is the farthest to the left when an observer is facing the display.

Flags flown outdoors, especially under Canadian climatic conditions, have a short life and should be replaced or removed before they become more of an embarrassment than a show of pride. A flag is considered to be worn when the colour has faded or the flag has become frayed. When a flag becomes tattered and is no longer in a suitable condition for use, it should be disposed of in a dignified manner. Flags made of natural fibres (wool, cotton, linen) should be burned in a dignified manner, privately, without ceremony or public attention being drawn to the destruction of the material. Flags made of synthetic material (nylon or polyester) should not be burned due to environmental damage and potential fire hazard. The Royal Canadian Legion's *Ritual, Awards and Protocol* manual also provides guidance on the proper positioning and handling of the National Flag within the context of Legion activities.

# BRANCH ELECTIONS: WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW BEFORE YOU VOTE

In anticipation of the Branch election to be held on Sunday April 28, the following article is reprinted from the General By-laws for Branches of the Ontario Provincial Command of the Royal Canadian Legion, as amended to February 2022. Members are encouraged to consult up-to-date Legion By-laws and guidelines publications available on-line on the Provincial and Dominion Command websites. Some printed copies are also available from the Branch office.

#### ARTICLE IV - QUALIFICATION TO VOTE AND/OR HOLD OFFICE

401. Only Ordinary, Life, Associate, and Affiliate-Voting Members in good standing shall have the right to vote and hold Office in their Branch.

402. A voting Member, to be eligible for election to any Branch Office, must be in good standing for the year in which the election is held.

403. A voting Member will be required to have served at least one (1) term on the Branch Executive Committee to be eligible to be elected President or Vice-President.

404. (1) A voting Member will be required to have been a Member of the Branch for a period of one (1) year prior to the date of the election to be eligible for election to the Branch Executive Committee.

(2) Branch Regulations may require a voting Member to attend a minimum number or minimum percentage of General Meetings and the period of time during which the minimum attendance must have been attained prior to the date of the Election Meeting.

Note: Where a Branch enacts a Regulation for this purpose, it will be necessary that it keep an accurate record of attendance of all Members present at General Meetings.

405. (1) No Member who is a full time, regular part time or elect to work employee of any Branch or Command, or any organization thereof, who receives directly or indirectly any salary or wages for or on account of any service rendered to the Branch or Command or organization thereof, shall be eligible to hold any Executive position in the Branch. Any employee as defined in this section who is successful in their bid for office must resign their paid position before their Term of Office can commence.

(2) Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, Members of the Ladies' Auxiliary employed by a Branch or Command may, at the discretion of the Branch or Command, hold Office in the Auxiliary.

406. No Member shall hold more than one elected Office in the Branch.

407. The Offices of Secretary and Treasurer shall not be held by the President or any of the Vice-Presidents.


408. The President shall not hold the position of Ladies' Auxiliary Liaison Officer.

409. The Term of Office shall be for one (1) year unless Branch Regulations make provision for a two (2) year term.

410. [NOT INCLUDED – Para 410 deals with subsequent appointments after the Elections]

## OPERATION: LEAVE THE STREETS BEHIND

From the files of Ontario Command

MISSION STATEMENT: To ensure that every Veteran who is homeless or near homeless finds the help they need to leave the streets behind.

In November 2009 Mr. Joe Sweeney, a Korean War Veteran who has dedicated much of his time to assisting homeless persons in the City of Toronto, wanted to organize a Remembrance Day Ceremony to honour the homeless Veterans. With assistance from The Royal Canadian Legion, Ontario Command it was held at the Scott Mission in Toronto. At the conclusion of the ceremony it quickly became evident that there were a number of homeless Veterans within the city and a team made up of personnel from Veterans Affairs Canada and The Royal Canadian Legion, Ontario Command were determined to see what could be done to assist them.

On September 24th, 2010 a partnership between The Royal Canadian Legion, Ontario Command and Veterans Affairs Canada was announced at the Good Shepherd Ministry in Toronto. With the assistance of Mr. Joe Sweeney, our Homeless Veterans Committee Project Advisor, they have approached other shelters in the downtown core.

When news of the program reached the Ontario Command Legion Branches, they were very eager to assist. A Veterans Assistance Fund was started at the Provincial Headquarters and the Branches responded with generous donations. With funds raised from the Ladies Auxiliary, "comfort bags" were assembled with personal items such as shampoo, shaving cream, shavers, hats, mitts and socks and distributed to Veterans through the Outreach Worker. With assistance from the Homeless Veterans Assistance Fund, we have been able to permanently house Veterans with assistance for their first / last month's rent, furniture and food vouchers. Rental assistance has also been provided to those facing eviction. Medical assistance has been given to other Veterans such as dental treatments, transportation to stress therapy clinics, eyeglasses and much more.

To date the Program has provided assistance in excess of \$3 Million to over 1136 Veterans in 197 Communities, 127 females and 52 families.

The Joe Sweeney Fund was created to ensure that these Veterans have suitable housing and/or the support services they require to remain permanently housed and with a stable future. Tax receipts can be issued for this fund.

In late 2012 we distributed a training package to our Branch Service Officers across Ontario. With their assistance the program will soon be known to all communities and their local resources such as the "Out of the Cold" program, Food Banks, Churches, Municipal and Provincial Government Offices, local emergency personnel (Police, Fire, and Ambulance) all asking the same question: "Have you had military service?". The result of their efforts is already tangible as we are fielding many calls to our office regarding the program.



#### THIS MONTH WE REMEMBER

## CAMP BORDEN & THE BIRTH OF THE RCAF

Military aviation in Borden goes back to early 1917 when a series of temporary hangars and aviation facilities were built to support the training of aviators for the Royal Flying Corps. After the Great War, Camp Borden became the central point around which military aviation would develop in Canada. In 1919, an Imperial Gift of over one hundred war surplus aircraft found their way to Canada, most of them going to Borden to provide the nucleus of a national Air Force. Following the creation of the Canadian Air Force in 1920, Camp Borden was once again selected as the main training centre for aviation. During the Twenties, Camp Borden saw the birth of the Royal Canadian Air Force (April 1, 1924) and claimed many firsts including the graduation of the first RCAF pilots in 1924. Camp Borden was also home to the first RCAF aerobatic team, the Siskins, in the late Twenties. Source: RCAF/16 Wing Borden

#### **BRANCH HISTORIAN REPORT**

They were for Harvey Phillips, who was featured in *The Maple Leaf* this month, for Jack Fitzpatrick, a branch Past President, and for Clifford Orton, a founding member of our branch. I have five more submissions ready to go, just waiting for signatures. New submissions or suggestions for submissions for that edition are welcome. You can see a sample MSRB write-up for Cecil Orton on this page. Clifford was a First World War Veteran from Coldwater, and a founding member of our Coldwater Branch.

#### **CLIFFORD REID ORTON**

Clifford Reid Orton was born in Coldwater, Ontario, on June 16, 1886. He was the son of David and Harriet (Reid) Orton. On June 17, 1916, he enlisted in the Army in Barrie, Ontario, with the 157th Battalion (Simcoe Foresters), Canadian Expeditionary Force. He was 30 years old and single. He listed his trade as clerk, and had no previous military experience. Private Orton, regimental number 642288, sailed on the S.S. Cameronia to arrive in England on October 28, 1916. After some training in England, he landed in France on March 9, 1917, assigned to the 116th Canadian Infantry Battalion, part of the 3rd Canadian Division. He later transferred to the Light Railway Construction Company. He returned to Canada after the war for Demobilization and was discharged on May 31, 1919. "Tippy", as Clifford was known, later married Ethel Mulligan. He was a founding member of the Royal Canadian Legion, Branch 270 Coldwater. He passed away on June 2, 1956, and is buried in the Coldwater Cemetery.




