Legions are not just buildings; they are the heart and soul of our communities. They provide a space for camaraderie, support, and remembrance. Through their various programs and initiatives, they offer crucial services that benefit veterans, their families, and the broader community.

Our government opened applications for Inclusive Community Grants to municipalities, non-profit organizations, and Indigenous communities for up to \$60,000 for local projects that will help older residents and people with disabilities participate in community life. Applications closed on May 22, 2024, and those that applied could receive funding to support independent and active living plus help reduce social isolation.

THEROYALCANADIANLEGIONASSESSMENT:2024 FEDERAL BUDGET

From the files of Dominion Command

OTTAWA, ON, 16 April 2024 – The Royal Canadian Legion is encouraged by crucial financial and conceptual commitments in the 2024 federal budget as they relate to veterans and defence, yet alarmed by the lack of ready-togo plans and actions to immediately tackle ongoing issues affecting still serving and retired Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) members.

"Details are sketchy," says Bruce Julian, Dominion President. "We are at a time when a lot of negative situations are converging, from a lack of affordable housing for our CAF members to insufficient modernized equipment in the field. We acknowledge the crucial financial commitment in this budget, but we also need to see a detailed timetable with expeditious actions."

The Legion is pleased to note new investments such as for the Veteran and Family Well-Being Fund, and further ongoing support for a telemedicine pilot project which would especially improve access for members located in more remote regions. However, in other areas of additional great concern, there are insufficient actions to produce immediate relief:

Housing: There is a commitment to look at re-purposing Crown lands for military housing, but it is not accompanied by a specific timeline to make a difference immediately. The government recently announced it will launch a \$295 million housing strategy over 20 years but that's an excessively long time frame. The proposal for the construction of 1,400 new military housing units over the next 20 years will not address the urgent need. This will also do little to address the CAF retention issues. With circulating reports of unhoused or precariously housed CAF members due to a likely range of causes today, our country needs a strategy "yesterday."

Mental health: There is no mention of increased or better access to mental health supports, or new supports to tackle operational stress injuries faced by members. Tackling the backlog: The backlog in disability claims continues, yet there is nothing in the budget to identify whether all temporary staff will be kept on permanently to help finally eliminate this pressing problem.

Some of the issues affecting still serving and veteran CAF members have been percolating for years, such as the need for improved transition planning and outcomes for members returning to civilian life. The outgoing CAF ombudsman recently expressed his own upset publicly, and in a media opinion piece described his experiences with the "never-ending" story of gathering advice and studies over many years but seeing no concrete action when it comes to some of his office's key recommendations.

"Belaboured processes should be eliminated," says Julian. "Those of us assisting CAF members know what is wrong, and the solution is not another plan potentially filled with administrative delays, we need a series of immediate actions – similar to how our country performed during the pandemic," he emphasized. "The Legion connects closely with Canada's veterans daily, and we hear of hardships and worries regularly. We are ready to help our government and stakeholders with insights, ideas, and support to facilitate timely activity. We are all in this together and we all need to be nimble."

The Legion calls strongly upon successive governments to end what appears to be constant verbal and administrative quagmires that affect momentum. Our country needs to take concrete, visible steps towards fixing the issues that continue to plague our veteran population, now.

Further, the recently released Defence Policy Update (DPU) had great information about global security factors and provided clear objectives – but it was equally long on plans, commitments, and assurances of increased spending, while being short on the immediacy of implementation. This is especially problematic because the Legion notes that some items are contingent upon one another to have a tangible effect. Some key examples:

The timely delivery of needed new equipment is just around the corner, but there will likely be insufficient personnel to operate it.

Excellent initiatives and commitments are planned to modernize the CAF's Navy, Air Force, Space and Cyber components, but its regular and reserve Army will remain in a poor state of readiness without sufficient changes.

There is a welcome increase in defence spending but it comes alongside the reality of defence budget cutbacks, so the funding increase is not what it looks like.

There is a crucial proposal to fix the outdated procurement process, but still no actual completion date for a planned – and urgently needed - procurement strategy.

A GLIMPSE INTO THE PAST: THE GABRIELS

Submitted by Comrade John O'Hara, 2nd Vice President The thought of a Legion Band in Coldwater had been tossed around for a while. One day in mid-1980s, Charlie Worrel found several old trumpets and laid them on the Legion stage. Paul Bolyea picked up one and gave a couple of tuneful toots; Charlie said, "looks like you are the music director", and the Branch 270 *Gabriels* were born. They gathered a group of avid local musicians of all calibres to fill the required spots in the group. Glockenspiels, bass drum, snares and horns were all a part of the band. The band practiced every Tuesday at the branch. They were a social group that loved playing music.

The Gabriels started out playing in and around Coldwater, but soon, as the band grew, getting everyone to events became increasingly difficult. They were sorely in need of transportation. A school bus in Port Severn, being too old to carry students was for sale for \$1,200. The band set about thinking as to how they could afford the vehicle. During a session around the Big Story table in the Club Room, the subject was broached that a bus was available, but had a significant price tag. Vic Turner (local Florist) was sitting there listening, and without any prompting he took out his cheque book and contributed \$1,000 toward the bus, money he had won in a lottery. He stated this was a great cause to spend the money on, so thanks to Vic the Gabriels acquired a school bus to take them on their trips. They blacked out the school bus name and drove it till they disbanded. Vic was happy he had a place of honour in the front seat whenever there was an event. He had lost most of his sight, but enjoyed the trips with the Band.

The new wheels provided an easier method to get the band and their instruments around rather than the previous multiple vehicles. The *Gabriels* had many adventures. They led the Coldwater parades and played all over Ontario and down to the States, often inviting themselves to events for the fun of playing. They would travel to an event and line up in the parade, no one knew the difference that an extra band was playing. As recounted to me they went to Barrie for a parade unannounced and were lined up in the parade when a young lady with a clipboard came along and said "you are a band? Here is your \$500". Bonus! The camaraderie ran deep as they would often take part in "Band Booze Cruises", stopping at different Legion branches and taking advantage of the hospitality offered to those in uniform. There were free drinks, refreshments and often food.

The band, now that they had transportation, were playing at an ever-increasing variety and number of functions. They were becoming well known all over Ontario and paid events followed. They were making enough to cover the cost of the band, uniforms, fuel, accommodation, expenses and new instruments and thereby amassed a sizable bank account. Control of the band finances and autonomy to operate became an issue, which led to the disbanding of the *Gabriels*. A sad finish.

Charlie Worrel, Jack Walsh, Vic Turner, Paul Bolyea, John Bolyea, and Katherine Bolyea, were some of the folks that contributed to the *Gabriels*. Paul is still our Branch 270 bugler for all occasions, always ready and willing to assist. We still use the Bass Drum, with the *Gabriels* logo for Remembrance Day parade, St Patty's Parade and a host of Community event parades. It helps to keep everyone in step. Thank you to Paul Bolyea for the information he provided for this story. Please note that the date for the Seniors Literary Luncheon has been changed to Sunday, July 14 at 1:00 p.m. at Branch 508 Everett.

BUILDING MANAGER REPORT

My report is as follows:

- Monthly extinguisher/exit light review was completed. Huronia Alarms re-scheduled their annual inspection to May 29, 2024;

- I attended the Battle of the Atlantic wreath laying ceremony in conjunction with the Ladies' Auxiliary convention on May 5. Nice to see a good turnout at our cenotaph;

- Roof repairs to section "A" were quoted by four local companies. Due to urgency, repair was awarded to 1883146 Ontario Limited (Member Chris Rhinold). Repairs started week of May 6 and were completed May 17. Chris mentioned that he is going to make sure nothing else needs to be cleaned up. Drop ceiling tiles will be replaced as soon as we confirm that no more water is coming in;

- We received one email from a member asking about the quoting process for the roof repairs. I replied to the questions and received a signed off copy of our motion and a thank you for my reply. This motion for roof repair was forwarded to all members and was formally presented at our General Meeting on May 28;

- One of the clubroom A/C units is acting up again. Hoping we hear back from our grant application soon or we will have to come up with an alternative plan for repairs or replacement;

- Driveway paving from the OTF grant is in Severn Township's and suppliers' (Global Simcoe Paving's) hands as Severn Township requires some kind of identification on the corner of our property and the street. The Township is sending a survey team in the next two weeks and their application that is required has been forwarded to Simcoe Global Paving;

- All electrical repairs for now have been completed.

Thursday Night Darts held the year end banquet on May 9 in the Club Room. Needless to say, there was no shortage of food! Congratulations to the "A" division champions:




